

HISTORY MINISTRY

AN AFRICAN AMERICAN MOMENT IN HISTORY "JUNETEENTH"



Ashton Villa, Galveston Texas

On June 19, 1865, from the balcony of Galveston Texas' Ashton Villa, General Gordon Granger of the Union Army read what is known as "General Order No. 3", which proclaimed unto the people of Texas, the emancipation of all slaves. This pronouncement came some two years after President Lincoln's signing of the Emancipation Proclamation, which officially set all enslaved people free as of January 1, 1863. Supposedly, word had not reached the Texas authorities about the freeing of the slaves until the Union Army's arrival into Galveston on June 18, 1865. Legend has it, that a messenger, traveling by horseback, came into Texas in 1863 to tell of the emancipation, but was ambushed and killed before he could spread the good news.

In the early years, as the former slaves began planning annual celebrations of their new founded freedom, they were met with great opposition by some of the disgruntled Whites. The now freedmen/women of color were refused use of the existing parks for their festivities. As a result of these denials, all across the state of Texas, the freed people began pooling their funds to purchase land to host their jubilee events. These collaborative efforts resulted in the establishing of such landmarks as *Emancipation Park* in the State Capital of Austin, TX, *Booker T. Washington Park* in Mexia, TX and *Emancipation Park* in Houston, TX. Proof positive that if we, as a people, bond and work together for a common cause we can accomplish great feats.

Over the years to follow, as Jim Crow Laws were enacted, the Great Depression befell the land, in some form or fashion, the merriment continued. During the Great Migration, which saw over five (5) million blacks flee from the South to the North and West Coast, these former slaves, decedents of slaves and their families settled all across the United States taking this celebratory tradition with them.


Now in the current day, forty-five (45) of the fifty (50) States recognize this distinctive day of celebration, known as "Juneteenth" as a National Day of Observance. The "Juneteenth" celebrations have made their way beyond the US borders to such places as Paris, France and many US Military Bases around the World. Locally, for the past 14 years, a large scale celebration has been held annually in Durham, NC commemorating this special moment in African-American History. This year's event will be held on Saturday, June 16th in the 300 block of East Main Street at 1:00pm to 10:00pm.




